Police Chief Acknowledged for Domestic Violence Work

Verizon Wireless recently presented Minneapolis Police Chief Timothy J. Dolan with the Hope Line Law Enforcement Partnership Award, which comes with a grant of \$10,000. The award is to recognize his leadership toward reducing domestic violence and his support of an innovative pilot program involving new training for police who respond to domestic violence calls and close work between the MPD, advocates and the City Attorneys.

It was noted that in 2009, for the first time in 10 years, there were no homicides attributable to domestic violence in Minneapolis.

Under the pilot program, successful prosecution of domestic violence cases went from 50% to 79% in 2009. Chief Dolan recognized the essential work of Insp. Kris Arneson of the 5th precinct when accepting the award. The MPD also secured federal Violence Against Women Act funds to add one city attorney and three advocates to the Domestic Assault Unit. The \$10,000 Hopeline grant will be used to add another advocate to the Unit.

CM Colvin Roy, speaking at the ceremony, said she was proud of Chief Dolan, the Minneapolis Police Department and the City Attorney's office for giving this crime the attention it deserves. "Sadly, there are still a lot of people that view domestic violence as a private matter," said CM Colvin Roy. "The fact that the crime of domestic violence happens at home just means that it is that much more intimate, that much more enduring, and that much more difficult to combat."

Howe School Site Meeting to View New Proposal

Last August, United Properties (UP) entered into a purchase agreement with Minneapolis Public Schools (MPS) for the Howe School site. The agreement expires in August, 2010. UP was planning to build senior cooperative housing. The Howe School Redevelopment Task Force, a resident committee of the Longfellow Community Council (LCC) was created to monitor the development.

The Task Force is hosting a meeting on June 16th to update residents about what has happened with the Howe School site and to hear about a potential new proposal from United Properties.

Recently, UP reached the conclusion that their original plans to build senior cooperative housing were not financially feasible for them. They have another idea for 50 units of rental, workforce housing that they'd like to present for community reaction. Since the Task Force was created to monitor the original proposal, they feel it is time to return to the broader community for a reaction to this new idea. With the purchase agreement soon to expire, UP would like to know if their new proposal for rental housing is something that the community would support.

Peace Pole Dedicated at Wellstone International

On May 3, a ceremony was held at Wellstone International High School to re-dedicate their school's peace pole. A peace pole is a monument that displays the message “May Peace Prevail on Earth” on each of its four or six sides, usually in different languages. There are tens of thousands of Peace Poles in 180 countries all over the world dedicated as monuments to peace. Students of the school read from their award winning poetry on peace and music was provided by students as well (see photo above.)

CM Colvin Roy participated in the dedication ceremony and told the crowd,

Sometimes it seems like talking about peace is viewed as silly or naive. It takes courage to stand up for peace. People like Martin Luther King Jr. and Senator Paul Wellstone had that courage, and they changed the world. We can too. Senator Wellstone said, "The future belongs to those who believe in the beauty of their dreams." Today, we are renewing our dedication to believe in our dreams. To believe peace is possible and to work for peace.

Minneapolis Funding from Legislature this Session

Despite the ongoing budget crisis, lawmakers managed to enact several proposals that seek to stimulate the economy, provide financial stability for public pensions and prevent additional reductions to property tax credits. Several policy bills passed this year in such areas as public health, public safety, transportation and human services.

Below are some measures that will have a direct impact on Minneapolis:

Capital bonding bill: Among the \$700 million in bonds for projects across Minnesota are two Minneapolis priorities - construction of a new Northtown Railyards Bridge (a city priority due to its fracture critical design) and addition of an apparatus bay for the City's Emergency Operations Center. Other projects located in the City include Orchestra Hall and Peavey Plaza renovations, Lowry Bridge construction, Victory Veteran's Memorial Drive improvements and HCMC Hyperbaric Center construction.

Pensions: Along with providing financial stability for statewide pension funds, the omnibus pensions bill brings security to retirees under the closed Minneapolis Employee Retirement Fund, or MERF. Under the measure, the State and the City will provide financial stability to MERF, which has become drastically underfunded due to market losses and its closed nature. Once MERF achieves 80-percent funding, it will merge with the Minnesota Public Employees Retirement Association (PERA). The City's annual contribution to MERF is estimated to rise by \$20 million to \$23 million starting in 2012.

Local Government Aid: Minneapolis' cuts were around \$10.8 million. When added to the \$22 million in previous cuts, the State reduced the City's 2010 aid by \$32 million. While high, it's only about a third of what was initially considered.

Jobs Bill: The jobs bill authorized tax credits and provisions intended to stimulate construction of projects stalled by the economy. 1) the state historic tax credit mirrors the federal program and could provide incentives for the rehabilitation of historic buildings. 2) the angel investment credit is intended to provide an incentive for investment in start firms located in Minnesota.

Summer walking tours showcase Minneapolis' history

Take a walk through history as you visit 21 areas of Minneapolis this summer, ranging from cultural gathering places and residential neighborhoods, to bustling commercial industrial area, to the theaters of Hennepin Avenue and remnants of the city's extensive streetcar system. The Minneapolis Heritage Preservation Commission and the City of Minneapolis Department of Community Planning and Economic Development will offer a series of expert guide-led tours of historic sites throughout Minneapolis between May 31 and Sept. 18.

Tours are free (except for the Como Harriet Streetcar Line tour, \$5 charge; American Swedish Institute's Park Avenue neighborhood tour, \$6 charge). Tour sizes are limited and participants should arrive 15 minutes before the start of the tour to obtain a ticket and sign a waiver. Reservations are not required except for the two Park Avenue tours, Tree Canopy tour, and the Grain Belt Brewery tour, which request a pre-registration.
